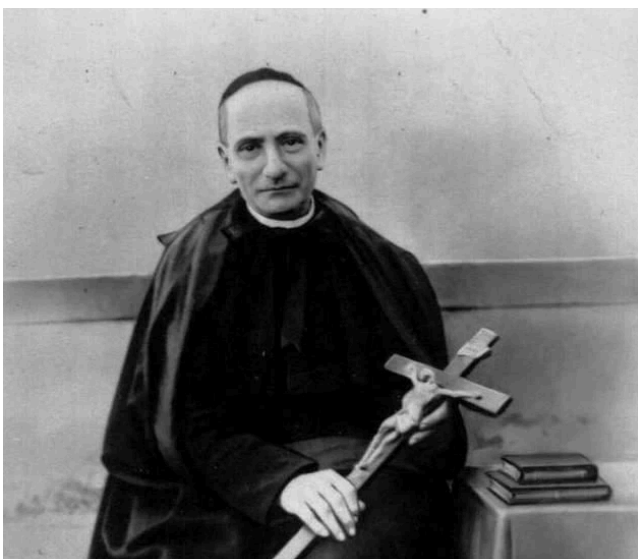




Saint Hannibal di Francia

Saint Hannibal di Francia was the official appointed censor of Luisa Piccarreta's writings before he died. He was the founder of the Rogationist Fathers and the Sisters of Divine Zeal. During his life he was highly esteemed by St. Pius X, who willingly granted him private audiences. St. Pius X showed particular interest in Luisa Piccarreta's writings, and Saint Hannibal sought his approval before publishing them.

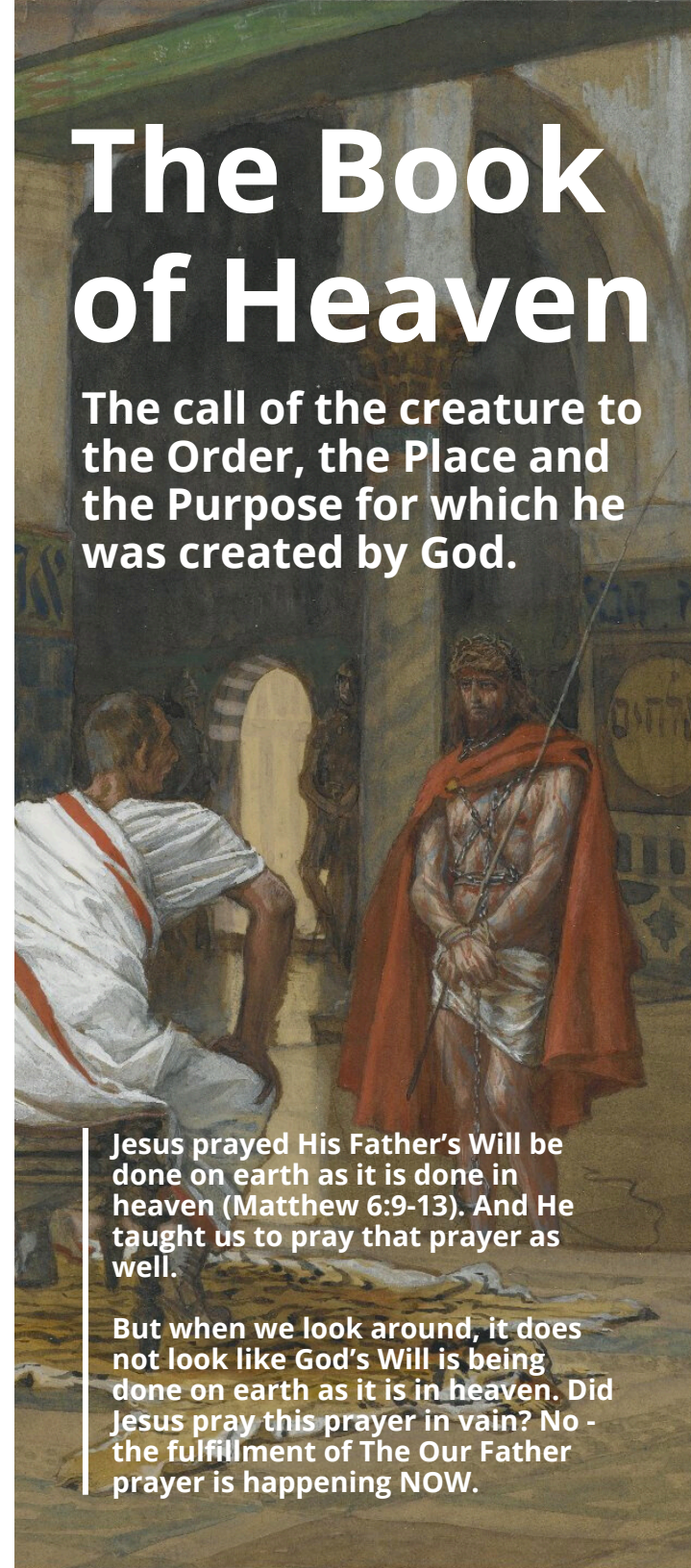

Being in my Will, they concur with all the good that can be both in Heaven and on earth.

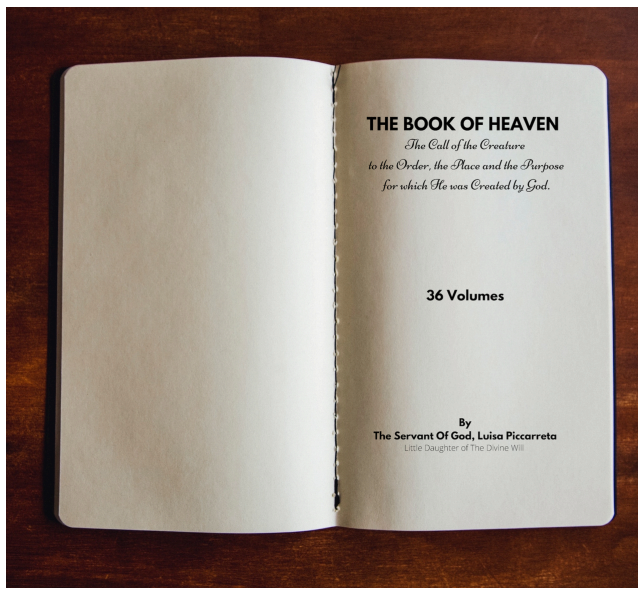
The Book of Heaven

Is it approved by the Catholic Church?

All 36 volumes of the Book of Heaven have 4 imprimaturs. (The imprimaturs indicate there are no doctrinal errors in the original volumes.) Moreover, the first 19 volumes also have nihil obstats for the Italian versions due to the work of St. Hannibal to publish them.

At this time the Church is working on the release of the official definitive translations of all the volumes before giving them the nihil obstat due to ambiguities in the writings. *It is very important to note when reading the current translations in circulation of the 36 volumes that they are not 100% accurate. This is why it is important for the Church to create an official translation of the Book of Heaven.



WHAT IS THE BOOK OF HEAVEN?

Jesus revealed to an Italian woman, Servant of God Luisa Piccarreta (1865 - 1947), in the Book of Heaven what the "Our Father" prayer meant.

He explained how it will come to pass: "Thy Will be done on Earth as it is done in Heaven." The revelations of 36 volumes of diary entries were compiled into the BOOK OF HEAVEN - The call of the creature to the Order, the Place and the Purpose for which he was created by God.

In 1926, volumes 1-19 of Luisa's spiritual diary was published with the Imprimatur of Archbishop Joseph Leo as well as the Nihil Obstat of St. Hannibal Di Francia.



Who is Luisa Piccarreta?

Luisa Piccarreta was an Italian mystic (April 23, 1865 - March 4th, 1947). During her life, she was dictated The Book of Heaven by Jesus. The book explains the "greatest" gift of the Divine Will, and how God's Will will come to reign on the earth as it reigns in heaven.

She was in constant obedience to her confessors and to the teachings of the Catholic Church during her life.

One of her confessors was St. Hannibale Maria di Francia. He is a canonized saint with a statue dedicated to him in St. Peter's Cathedral in the Vatican.

With the encouragement of St. Pius X, St. Hannibal published volumes 1-19. He died in 1927. His body is buried in Messina, Italy in the Basilica Santuario Sant'Antonio. It appears to be incorrupt.
